It just does not feel like Christmas will be here soon. Holger and Ingrid Hansson, our coordinators in Sweden, and a friend Mike are with me on this trip. We just finished supper with 53 children. The beans, rice, tortillas and a little chicken tasted good. We had treated the children to soda and candy which they don't get too often. They are all smiling with happiness.


The children are all around us. They want to hold hands, the little ones compete for a lap to sit on and the big boys and girls want us to play soccer or volleyball with them. The house father had just told the children that we represented the thousand donors that help pay for the food, housing, the helpers, and the schools. The "muchas gracias" (many thanks) are expressed in many different ways by the children, especially for you that live so far away but love so much.

But Christmas is coming. Now it is time to rehearse the Christmas Play. The man who looks after the boys has written a play so that all 53 children and youth will have a part. We do not understand the words, but the meaning is clear. They told us that the play will be performed at several places to tell the story of Christ's birth and to obtain extra donations.

Lise from Norway is also here. She came in September to spend eight months at the home. The children just love her and she tries her best to give all of them a little attention. We had brought a big box with crayons, paper, felt tip pens, glue, etc. so she can work with the children making things. We also had good used sneakers to be distributed. The box was from a Vacation Bible School in Hatboro, PA.

The climate may be hot here, but the true Spirit of Christmas is the same as in Norway, Sweden, and USA. The staff of Caring Action of Caring Action for Children send you thanks for your support and wish you a wonderful holiday.

SHELTER FOR YOUNG MOTHERS AND BABIES, MONTERREY, NL.



ESPERANZA HOME FOR CHILDREN, BONFIL, Q. ROO

Tor and May, with the work team from PA, visited the home and met the new housemother Miriam Bernice Caamal. She is a young Mayan teacher that felt she was called to take care of homeless children. She came as an answer to our prayers and now she has two young boys, Rosendo 6 and Felix 9 year old to care for. They were not accepted in the public school as they did not have proper documents so Miriam is therefore teaching them in the home.

The building is completed and looks beautiful. Team members from New Haven, IN and Hatboro PA Methodist Churches presented gifts to buy six more beds for the dorm. You now sponsor the two boys and a baby girl, Esther. More children will arrive when the home is known on the Yucatan Peninsula. The combined team from PA, IN, FL, NY, and Sweden also worked for one week to help our friend Luis Castillo build the "Unica Esperanza" (101) Church in Cancun.
