## **Christmas in the Homes**

The celebration of Christmas may be a little different in Mexico than in the USA and Scandinavia. The typical Mexican Christmas starts a week earlier with the "Posada" (the search for an Inn.) Celebrations continue with the Birth of Christ and last until the arrival of the "Three Kings", (Wise Men), a week after New Years.

We usually spend much time sending greeting cards and shopping for gifts for relatives and friends. The Mexicans spend more time visiting family and enjoying festive meals.

In the Homes for Children, hand-drawn cards are made to give to visitors. Postage in Mexico is very expensive so not many cards are sent. Besides, who do the children send greetings to? A mother living at an unknown address going from job to job? To a father who abandoned them and their mother a long time ago?



Traditional families, that our special children meet in the community, are so excited and tell of their plans to go on Posadas." That is an re-enactment of Joseph and Mary in the streets of Bethlehem to find an Inn. Children are dressed up in costumes and with music and much excitement, parade to homes of friends and relatives who are waiting to see them and give out treats!

Our special children in the Homes can not find relatives to visit. They must depend on Mexican Christians to visit them for "Posadas." Several groups come and bring gifts and goodies. These children often act out Christmas stories in the Home with the caring visitors.

The Birth of Christ is celebrated on Christmas Eve - first at a church service, and then at a Fiesta at the Home. A Christmas tree is a luxury cost often

skipped in favor of a decorated Baby in a crib. It is usually warm outside so the Fiesta can be a picnic with a bonfire and special Mexican tacos and tamales. The Houseparents make sure that each child receives one or two toys.

Some of the children may have a relative visiting during the next few days. This is exciting for some, but sad for those who do not have any relatives that visit. The Christmas celebration lasts until the "Three Kings Day" in January. A final toy may then be received as a reminder of the gifts of the Kings. After that it is time to go back to school!

The older students in Cinco Banderas and Mano Homes are encouraged to travel to make contact with relatives during the vacation time. They are given travel money for that purpose. Usually they come back to relatives and old friends with a witness of a new Faith in Christ!

We appreciate the extra money you give the children at Christmas time. We will extend it to last for a long time. Remember Jesus who said:

"What you have done to the least of these, you have done for Me!"


#### **MEMORIAL**
