Family Reunion for a Day



The picture above shows a mother with 6 children. Nothing unusual about that. Several destitute mothers and some fathers come to the Home for visits once or twice a year. This story is a little different. The father of these children is dead, and the mother is serving time in jail for murder.

Three years ago five of their children were brought to the home by authorities. They were in poor health but have been raised with love in a Christian environment. Now, the mother had been given some "free time" to see her children and to ask the Home to take care of her youngest boy also. Pictured in the center, he probably was becoming too old to be with her in jail.

This was Saturday, and it was so touching to see how all her children stayed with her in a corner of the property all day. They were telling about experiences and showing their new found Christian love and forgiveness. They proudly introduced me to their Mama and she agreed to me taking this picture. Up until then I did not even know that all 6 of these children were siblings. She was very thankful for their care and to see that all looked so healthy and full of life in this beautiful Home.

When she asked if her youngest child could stay in the Home, the directors were torn about what to say. Official documents were required, even when the government did not pay a centavo for placement. We know the cost for one child is about \$750 a year now. Sufficient operating funds for the 27 children is lacking now with prices rising rapidly in Mexico.

Mother and young son had to depart at the end of the day for a 12 hour bus ride to the State of Tabasco, She was happy to know that many strangers with the love of Jesus are caring for her children and that the five are praying for her and the little brother. Truly the children were a witness of Christ to their mother!

When work groups travel to the Homes, they write about their experiences with the children. Here is one we received.

Jose the Caterpillar

"On all our trips to the Children's Homes, we have a devotional time. This day the devotion leader used a child's book about a caterpillar. This caterpillar was not very attractive as he grew ugly eating up all the healthy green leaves all day. Then a strange thing happened. Soon the ugly caterpillar turned into a beautiful butterfly! God had created something that at first seemed destructive and not attractive into a beautiful creature!

Children at the Home arrive there sometimes just like a caterpillar. Wrapped up in their own misery and afraid of a new place. We got to meet one this visit. Jose, 12 years old, had arrived a few days earlier. He was from a family which practiced witchcraft. They had left Jose to himself since early childhood. He could not write his name and had difficulty relating to people.

Our group was drawn to him and made special efforts to include him in our work and play with the other children. He struggled, we could see, and he did not know how to cope in this new environment. We hugged him and held his hand a lot. We showed him to write his name and called him by name to let him know he was somebody!

By the end of our week, Jose was finally starting to smile, come and a with us on his own, and almost ask for our hugs. We had told him the butterfly story and he kept holding on to the book. A quiet smile came on his face when we called his name. The other children had followed our lead and began to accept him.

The day we left we assured Jose that we would come back and that God loved him more than we could! That morning all the children sang a song in English. As God's little butterflies, their smiles were beautiful!

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
OUR TWO-FOLD MISSION


