





We were eager to visit the Esperanza Children's Home, as it was in the direct path of Hurricane Wilma last fall.

Pastor Ascensio and his wife Esther are the Director's of this Home. They told us how they huddled with 20 children for two days and nights in a small room on the main floor during the hurricane. Wind and rain blew in the doors and windows, put a hole in the

roof so the water poured into their bedrooms, and destroyed their rooftop water and gas tanks and fencing.

All is looking good now, and life is back to normal. They are having some difficulties financially, however, as the local support they had come to depend on from churches, stores and resorts in nearby Cancun, has stopped, as everyone has suffered financially from the hurricane. Caring

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
