A Report from Mama Pau

My name is Hallvard Bruvoll, I'm a 19 year old student from Norway, and have been serving at the Mamá Paulita home in El Limón for about seven months. I've experienced a lot, and all the impressions from this different world will probably be going through my mind over and over again in the future. It is with mixed feelings that I now witness my last few days here passing by, but I feel that it will be hard to say the final goodbye, knowing that I may not see any of these people again. I've become very good and close friends with some of the kids here at the home, and many have shared with me their unique and incredible stories. Here I'd like to share a couple of them to you.

During my stay here several older kids have left the home, while others, mostly small ones, have entered. Two of these new ones are brother-and-sister, 7 and 5 years old. Both of them had difficulty adjusting to the Home; they didn't obey anyone, and misbehaved frequently. Besides that, they always talked about things that small children




like them shouldn't even know about. They were just too familiar with things like pornography and raw violence. This meant that someone had to be looking after them constantly in the beginning, which is quite difficult since the home now has around 40 kids, and only 4 adults who take care of all of the daily matters. Fortunately, after being exposed to the loving routines and disciplines in the Home, the children adjusted. Through my 7 months here, I've seen some children enter the home with violent, swearing and aggressive behavior, and some that are frightened and silent. By receiving the warmth, love and care, and also a lot of guidance as well as learning about Christ and the Bible, they gradually turn become the wonderful persons that they were born to be.

About the two kids that I mentioned, we now know that they both were sexually abused before coming here. The Mexican government finally found out about what was going on in their home, the parents are now in jail and the kids will hopefully stay here until they're ready to continue their lives on their own. Here they are in very good hands; the home has a psychiatrist who comes regularly and talks with all of the children. The girl had several small burn marks on her body from before she came here, and showed in many ways that she was willing to do ANYTHING to earn money. We've also noticed that when the girl is outside playing and falls, even from higher altitudes, she never cries, she just takes a deep breath, and makes herself rock hard, as if she has taught herself to disconnect the feeling of pain from her body. The girl now knows that here she has all she needs, the

people here give her clothes, food, toys, friends and care, and that she doesn't have any need to be begging for anything. She knows that her body is her own, and that she won't let anyone do her any harm, at any price.

I had never thought before I came here, that seeing a five year old girl playing with her dolls just as a normal five year old girl should be playing, could wake such emotions. I hope that I never will be able to forget this girl, nor her brother or any of the other boys and girls here at the Mamá Paulita, and I'm grateful for every experience that I've had during my stay here. Thank you all for helping these children and letting them grow up in such a good environment, securing them a better education and a worthy life.

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
