Mama Paulita Home

The Mama Paulita Home in El Limon, Tamps., cares for 40 Children in El Limon, Tamps. Extra funds were sent by Caring Action to help improve the laundry facility at the Home. The project should be finished this summer in time for the school season with so many uniforms to keep clean. The transfer to the schools in Monterrey proved to be a difficult transition for many reasons, so some of the older children are electing to continue their career education in the nearby city of Mante. While attending school in Mante, they continue to

help with the younger children. One young man who grew up at Mama Paulita and graduated from college has offered to help with maintenance of the Home. The children are reported to be in good health.

The Shelter in Monterrey

42 babies and children live in The Shelter. They are cared for by several dedicated workers.....preparing food, washing clothes, and cleaning up after the children. Caring Action for Children sent extra funds in the last quarter to the Shelter to help finish an apartment on campus for a permanent house parent couple to live in. Most of these funds were donated by a business man from Denmark. (Many thanks!) The current House Mother, Martha Rojas, must commute 1/2 hour from her house to the Shelter and she says that she is starting to think about retiring and serving on the Patronato Board. Interviews for Houseparents have been started. Donations from Mexicans enabled the Shelter to give the 7 helpers a bonus for Mother's Day. They all work very hard to give children much attention! Please keep the patronato and the children in your prayers as they search for a loving Christian couple to take on this amazing work.

Esperanza Home

The 14 children in this Home located near Cancun in Bonfil, Q.R. range from ages 5 to 15. All attend local schools and the church in Cancun where the house parents, Pastor and Mrs. Mancilla also serve. Several attempts have been made to find a suitable live-in house parent but to date a mission minded couple has not been found. Two part time helpers are employed to cook and do laundry. Again, please keep the Esperanza Home in your prayers as they strive to care for God's precious children in the Bonfil area, and that the right houseparents will be found.

La Familia Home

The building of a second floor for youth dorms continues and may be finished later this year. Following construction, La Familia will be able to provide a loving home for up to 90 children. Several teams of US. volunteers have visited this



year. Caring Action, along with a Pennsylvania area church are sponsoring a mission trip to La Familia 26 October to 2 November this year. Children enjoy visitors who give them a lot of attention and often recreation trips outside the home. This Summer the children were treated to a vacation trip to another Home near the Pacific Ocean. Visits to the beach were enjoyed by all!
