

# Esperanza Home for Children: A Place of Love

Pastor Ascensio Mancilla and his wife Esther began this Home together with Caring Action for Children over 20 years ago. Esperanza currently cares for 9 children, ranging in age from 3-19. (The eldest grew up in the Home and continues to live there while going to school to train as a chef.)



One of the youngest boys was recently brought to them by his mother. She moved to Cancun from Chiaupas looking for work. She has no formal education and does not read or write. She was not able to feed and care for her son, and so brought him to the Casa Esperanza in Bonfil, about 15 minutes from downtown Cancun.



To Esther, each child is special and deserving of love. While treating Esther to a shopping trip in Cancun, we met Maya, a young woman who grew up in Esperanza and is now married with a young child. It was heartwarming to see the greeting between Esther and Maya and to hear her son refer to Esther as "grandmother."

# Making a Difference in the lives of Indigenous Middle and High School Students



Caring Action Board members Susan Newsom and Shirley Becker visited the HEI Home (Hogar Estudiantil Indgenous) in Tlaxiaco last month. A 5 hour drive from Puebla, we arrived late morning, spent the afternoon there with the students and patronato (local board), and then drove back to Puebla.

While there, we heard a report on the students—what they were studying, and what their long term goals are. The 17 students living there come from the mountainous region of southern Mexico and are so grateful for the opportunity to attend school and prepare for a career and life as a responsible adult.

We also received a report on the property and some of the maintenance needs.

- It is important to waterproof the roof, as leaking from the roof during the rainy season has caused erosion of interior walls and damage to ceilings. The estimated cost at that time was 6500 pesos..
- The entire home needs painting—exposure and water damage has caused peeling and cracking of the paint. To paint indoors and out will be 9,000 pesos.
- The exposed east and south walls of the main house are disintegrating due to poor quality of materials used in the original construction. They will need to remove and replace the material, with an estimated cost of 12,000 pesos.

To help make ends meet, they continue to raise corn in their fields, producing enough for their own consumption (and making fresh tortillas from it.) Their hen house now boasts of 33 hens, 3 roosters and 2 turkeys. The hens produce enough eggs for their consumption, but not enough to sell at the market. The students assist with maintaining these two projects: feeding the fowl and cleaning the hen house, planting, watering and harvesting the corn.

Finances continue to be a major issue here. Caring Action for Children started this Home by purchasing the land, and sending funds to build the facility. We continue to send financial support quarterly. Our policy has always been to get the Home up and running, and then to gradually reduce support payments, encouraging the patronato to find additional support in Mexico from local churches, etc...

The Methodist Church district encourages their local churches to donate to support this Home, but the churches barely have enough funds to survive themselves. They do give gifts in kind whenever possible, and donate material goods such as bags of rice, blankets and bedding, etc...
