Casa Hogar Mama Paulita: Dedication of the new Middle School

IT is with thanks to God that we celebrate the dedication of the new middle school on the campus of Mama Paulita, dedicated to the memory of Tor Jansen.

You may remember our reports that the town of Mante, and especially the streets around the Home, had become unsafe over the past few years because of gangs roaming the area. We had already built an elementary school next to the Home, but now it became necessary to add another story to the building so that the Middle School students could stay in the safety of the compound to attend school.

When Caring Action's Executive Director, Tor Jansen, passed away in 2013, memorial donations were appropriated to build the new middle school addition to the school. Funds collected were sent to the Patronato (board) in Mexico. They moved quickly and built this beautiful addition.

Thank you to all of you who made special donations in honor of Tor. His heart for the children of Mexico continues in the hearts of these young men and women striving for an education.

Here are their stories:

Yineli (the girl in the middle) is 2 1/2 years old. She arrived in March 2014 with her sister Dana (7yrs) and her brother Fernando (4yrs). They were sent to the Home by the authorities because they were being abused physically and emotionally by their mother, who is a drug addict and now is in jail. The father is missing. They have a grandmother who visits them once in awhile.

Gabriel (on the right) is 3 yrs old. He arrived last month with his sister who is 10, and a brother who is 14. They were sent to Mama Paulita because the neighbors complained to the police that their mother was abusing and neglecting them. The neighbors said that little Gabriel went missing one night and was found outside the house with no clothes on and in very bad shape. The government is investigating if they can return to live with their mother. Their father passed away 3 months ago.

Felipe (on the left) is almost 3 years old. He arrived last April along with his aunt who is only 10 years old. Felipe was brought to the Casa Hogar by the police. Neighbors had said that Felipe's eighteen year old mother and grandmother left him alone while they worked in a bar, and frequently came home drunk. The grandmother visits frequently, and while it is possible that she might get her 10 year old daughter back, Felipe's case is on trial right now and less certain to return to his mother. He told the authorities that he likes living at Mamá Paulita. His speech and motor coordination have greatly improved since he arrived; so, the authorities are considering leaving him there where he is well cared for and nurtured.



All three of these children could not smile when they arrived to the house. They were very solemn, untrusting, and afraid. God has been healing their hearts and now they smile, hug, give kisses, and ask for things without any fear. In addition to this emotional healing, their bodies have grown stronger, their coordination has improved, and their small and large motor skills have strengthened.
