Child Development 101

In order for children to be successful in school, they must be proficient in using a writing instrument—their small motor skills must be developed. From infancy, children learn to use their hands—first to grasp, hold, pick up and manipulate objects, and then to control a crayon/pencil to make marks on a paper. Many opportunities each day need to be provided for children to strengthen these muscles. Manipulating playdough, stringing beads, finger-painting, cutting with scissors, and drawing are all great activities to accomplish this goal.

I'm happy to report that we see these activities going on every day in the **Shelter for Babies and Abandoned Children** in Monterrey. Preschoolers are involved and engaged in developing these skills as they play with materials provided for them. We can see the results as the children get older and go to school and learn to read and write. Homework is done every day when the children return to the Home from school. Volunteers arrive in the afternoons to sit and help children get their homework done so that they can go and play!

The dollars that you donate every month are making such a difference in the lives of many children in the **Caring Action for Children** Homes. Without this opportunity, many of the children would be living on the streets or in places where they are not loved and cared for. At Casa Hogar, we all had to pitch in and help with the household chores. But all that we did will never compare to what they did for us. Today, I am a responsible man who learned to work hard to support his family. I am married and have three children who are my greatest treasures. I have told them about a beautiful place called Casa Hogar Mama Paulita, that was my home, and I have promised to take them there someday. I will never forget Casa Hogar, it became our home and it will always have a special place in my heart.

During my years at Casa Hogar, I learned lots of things: to plant and cultivate herbs, play soccer, make new friends, live peacefully with others, but the most important thing was that I met God.

A Former Student From The Cinco Banderas Home For Students in Monterrey Tells His Story



Hello.
My name is Alfonso Hernandez. I am from a Nahuatl indigenous town in Huiloapa, in the municipality of Benito Juárez in the State of Veracruz.
Since I was born until I finished my elementary school I lived with my parents in the Huiloapa community. In order to continue with my education in junior high school, it was necessary for me to move to a nearby town called Chicontepec in Veracruz. I lived there three years with two uncles and it was really difficult to adapt to this change in lifestyle and rhythm. Coming out from an indigenous community and going to a town is a complete change.
To continue in school, I had to move again to a larger city with a friend, who saw how I suffered with my uncles, and saw that my parents had no resources to help me through high school.

In 2008 I decided to come to Monterrey, Nuevo León, to attend a university, arriving with my sister who already worked in this city. Arriving in the city I subscribed to the University (Universidad Autónoma de Nuevo León [UANL]) and, of course, started to look for a job while I started the university. My sister started to look for a student house or shelter for me to live while attending the university because she found it difficult to help me pay rent . This was how on March 2009 I came to Casa Hogar Cinco Banderas.

During this period I have been in Cinco Banderas, (from 2009 to this date,) I had to work and make much effort to finish my studies in the university. I worked as a cashier at a 7-11 convenience store, cashier at Sanborns, waiter at weddings and finally I started my social service working as an intern in a car-manufacturing industry
I finished my education in May 2014 and graduated as Engineer in Mechatronics from UANL and to this day, with God's help, I work as a Development Engineer of the Refrigeration Department in a factory called Torrey.

I thank those people that have helped to support Cinco Banderas Home and give me the opportunity to complete my education and learn a career.
